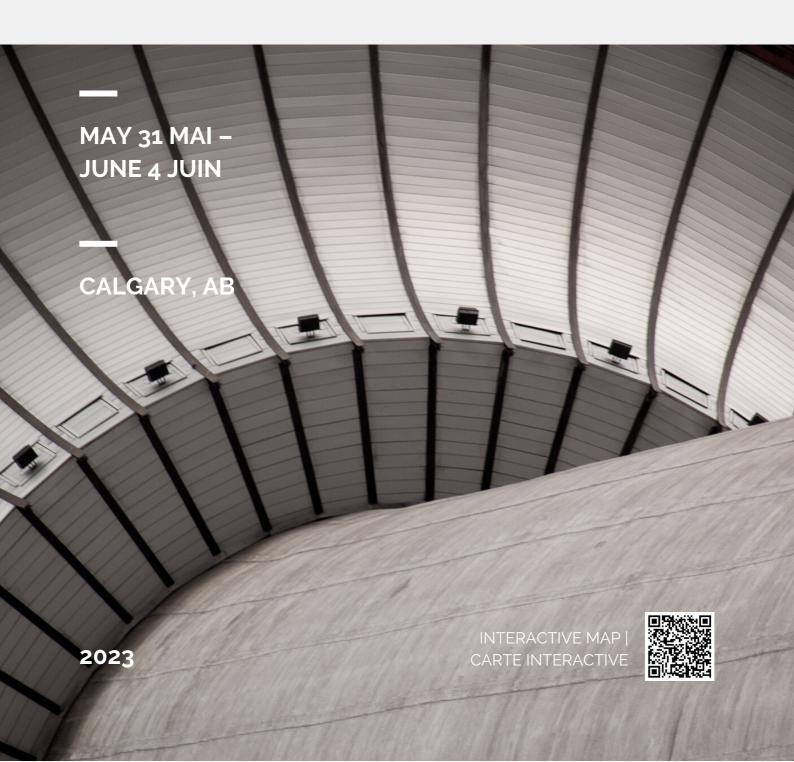

## ARCHIVAL CAST: REHOUSING SKETCHES IN THE BING THOM ARCHITECTS FONDS MOHAMMAD MOEZZI AND ROBB GILBERT

In 2015 Canadian Architectural Archives at the University of Calgary acquired the archive of Bing Thom Architects. The archive includes project files, photographs, presentation panels, and over 13,000 drawings that span two decades of the firm's work from 1981 to 2001. Approximately half of the total drawings in the archive are preliminary and conceptual sketches. Such an extensive volume of sketches provides a tremendous resource for researchers. The complex nature of the sketches however present challenges for archivists and historians who rely on them as essential resources for architectural research.

This presentation will provide an overview of the Bing Thom Architects archive and the work of the presenters over the past year to reprocess and improve the appraisal, description, and housing of the drawings. Describing the diverse range of sketches produced for a project often defied clear categorization or naming conventions. A lack of context and identifiable protocols (creator, date, sequence, etc.) problematized the interpretation and meaning attributed to the sketches. Archivists, students, and researchers, may struggle to make sense of any individual sketch. The presentation will introduce dialectical phenomenology as a method to understand the sketches across categories of language, graphics, content, materiality, and meaning. The Bing Thom Architects archive provides a unique opportunity to examine the challenges posed by sketches in an architectural drawing archive. The presenters will suggest approaches to improve what they assume archival casting, referring to the way architectural sketches are conserved and maintained to facilitate better utilization and comprehension by future researchers.
